Keynote: Hope in Liminal Time - Mark Sundby

According to Jim Wallis of Sojourners Magazine, Hope is "believing in spite of the evidence and then watching the evidence change." It can be a nebulous, elusive concept. Yet, the scriptures repeatedly identify hope as central to our walk as Christians, and the psychological literature finds it's a key to our well-being. In this talk, Mark will take a psychological lens to understand how hope can ground us in turbulent times and, most importantly, how we can actively cultivate it. When we daily live by hope, we will become purveyors of hope to our congregations and communities and "watch the evidence change."

Bio info:

Mark is a United Methodist minister and psychologist. For the past 23 years, as executive director (and now co-director) of LeaderWise, he has specialized in personality and leadership assessment, emphasizing health and wholeness, conflict skills training, and leadership development. The center contracts with businesses, denominations, and seminaries across North America and meets with a couple of thousand individuals each year to provide coaching, career counseling, psychotherapy, ministry assessments, and an array of other leadership development services.

Workshop: Resilience for Weary Leaders - Mark Sundby

re·sil·ience | \ ri-'zil-yen(t)s: the capability of a strained body to recover its size and shape after deformation caused especially by compressive stress (Merriam-Webster Dictionary)

For many of us we've experienced the "compressive stress" of world events as they've hit close to home over the past several years, and several of us have witnessed firsthand the "deformation" of our churches and communities by these pressures. Perhaps we've even experienced a deformation of sorts within ourselves at times. Despite our weariness, how can we recover the "size and shape" of our ministries - to rediscover our call anew?

Drawing upon the psychological research of resilience and his work with church leaders across denominations, Mark will share his observations about burnout, grief, and isolation among people in ministry - and tangible steps to heal, recover, and lead with resilience despite it all.

Cultivating Stillness in Chaos - Lillian Smith

We will explore and practice stillness in the mind and body when we become aware of the chaos in and around us. Why? Tending your body had a direct bearing on tending the Body of Christ.

Synod Partnership for Disaster Recovery (SPDR) - Kathy Lee-Cornell

Wildfires, tornadoes, floods, hurricane, and other acts of destruction and violence have impacted our communities and congregations across the Synod. This workshop will provide insight into the vision behind the Synod Partnership for Disaster Recovery and the opportunities before us in connectional ministry to be bearers of hope during times of chaos and loss.

Kathy serves as the Director for the Synod Partnership for Disaster Recovery (SPDR), a four-year pilot initiative of 11 presbyteries, the Synod of the Sun, and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. A graduate of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and the University of Texas School of Social Work, Kathy has served congregations and nonprofit organizations across Texas and Louisiana.
